 - SCR replied to data requests from 3C-REN and Public Advocate's Office

 - CPUC expected to release BP review schedule in June
 - Final Decision expected by late summer of 2023

- A.21-12-2009 SCE Application for Building Electrification Programs
 - O What's new:
 - SCE requesting \$677m for 2024-2027 to:
 - Install 250,000 electric heat pumps and provide electrical upgrades for 65,000 households
 - Emphasis on low-income, Environmental and Social Justice (ESJ) and vulnerable communities
 - Provide retrofit assessments and electrification upgrades to residential customers
 - Provide electrification support to businesses
 - O What's next:
 - CPUC to review SCE's proposal in 2022
 - Final Decision expected by April 2023
- R.20-08-022 Clean Energy Financing
 - What: Explore comprehensive financing strategies for customers to invest in clean energy technologies
 - O What's new:
 - 7 parties including LGSEC, SCE, and SoCalGas submitted program proposals
 - IOU proposals focus on expanding OBF offerings outside of EE (electrification, transportation electrification, etc.
 - O What's next:
 - Parties to submit community feedback and revised proposals (due June 15)
 - Opening Comments on revised proposals (due June 29)
 - Final Decision expected by November 202

- Alelia Parenteau (City of Santa Barbara) expanded on pilot description
 - Joe Susca (Culver City) asked to confirm if this discounted rate would only be for DACs/low-income customers
 - Alelia Parenteau (City of Santa Barbara) confirmed that it would be for everyone, w/ a focus on DACs
 - David Freeman (CVAG) asked if this would only apply to bundled customers?
 - Alelia Parenteau (City of Santa Barbara) confirmed that is has been designed to work with OBF - intended, not required
 - Steven Halligan (OCPA) would like to discuss further with Alelia
 - Alelia Parenteau (City of Santa Barbara) suggested adding comments/support to show interest in this proposal
- R.20-08020 NEM 3.0 Net Billing Tariff
 - What: Tariff for customers who generate their own energy and receive credit for any surplus sent to the grid
 - What's new:
 - Lookback study suggests that current NEM 2.0 tariff negatively impacts non-participant rates and disproportionally harms low-income ratepayers
 - December Proposed Decision introduces NEM 3.0 that could significantly increase payback on solar projects
 - Commission put PD on indefinite hold based on opening comments
 - Commission recently requested additional party feedback through Ruling on:
 - Glide Path Approach
 - Non-Bypassable Charges
 - Community Solar Tariff Programs
 - O What's next:
 - Reply comments on recent Ruling are due July 1
 - Minh Le (County) mentioned that comments are submitted on behalf of the



County, not SoCalREN as it goes beyond just EE

Description	Available to public agencies with water or power delivery authority. 50/50 cost share for projects that contribute to water supply reliability, including water conservation and renewable energy projects. There is a 50% cost-share requirement.	The program funds Collaboratives to conduct place-based capacity building activities, within a three-year grant term, that support under-resourced communities in accessing funding and resources to plan and implement climate mitigation, adaptation, and resiliency projects.

- o State Budget for Climate Resilience
 - 2022-23 State budget to be <u>passed on June 15th</u> (today)
 - Total of \$32 billion in climate resilience investments over 4 yrs within following categories:
 - Climate Resilience
 - o Water resilience and drought response
 - o Extreme heat
 - Nature-based solutions
 - Wildfire and forest resilience
 - Cap-and-trade expenditure plan
 - Energy



- Establishment of strategic electricity reliability
- Accelerating clean energy and storage projects
- Clean energy financing
- California arrearage payment program (CAPP)

- Climate Innovation
 - Lithium Valley Development
- There is also \$1.75 billion budgeted for implementation of zero-emission vehicles and related infrastructure.
- Through the Federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, California is estimated to receive over \$38 billion of formula-based transportation funding for several transportation programs including a new program that will support the expansion of an electric vehicle (EV) charging network.
